Message from Pastor Jeff:

Lent reminds us of the cross. It should not rob us of our joy.

The cross and our joy and inexorable linked. At first blush, this may appear contradictory. How can the anguish and suffering of the cross be linked to joy? But I want to suggest that the linkage between the two is the expression of faith's power.

Let's begin by making a distinction between happiness and joy. One does not have to be happy to be joyous. It helps, but happiness is not a prerequisite to joy. The story is told of a young Jewish girl who was held prisoner in a Nazi death camp. All around her were reminders of her fate. Yet daily she found joy in observing the wonder of birds in fight or some small remnant of wonder in the camp itself. Was she happy? No. Was she joyous? Yes.

The problem facing many of us is our pursuit of happiness is linked to our discovery of joy. Like children at Christmas, we desire some trinket and link our acquisition of a thing to our joy. And it works – at least for a period of time – until the novelty of having the object of our desire is replaced by our desire for something new. I would suggest that this is the fleeting nature of happiness.

Let me clarify that neither I nor the Christian faith have anything against being happy. I sincerely hope we can live in such bliss. But the truth is more complex and life far more capricious.

I have shared with some of you this understanding of the cross shared by Joseph Sittler:

"A cross is a blunt and graceless form. It has not the completeness and satisfying quality of a circle. It does not have the grace of a parabola or the promise of a long curve. A cross is a straight-up line abruptly crossed by a counterline. The assertive yes of its vertical is crossed and broken by the no of its horizontal. A cross speaks not of unity but of brokenness, not of harmony but of ambiguity; it is a form of tension and not of rest....The cross is the symbol because the whacks of life take that shape. Our lives are full of abandonments, infidelities, tragedies. The affirmation is always crossed by a negation. The vitalities of life move toward death. And unless you have a crucified God, you don't have a big enough God."¹

The unfathomable depth of our joy given the reality of life is thus dependent on the central symbol of our faith. The cross is both the affirmation of life's struggle against "powers and principalities," and the promise of God's ultimate triumph over the evil we are called to combat. This is why Lent reminds us of the cross. It does not rob us of our joy.


Board of Missions and Social Action

The Board of Missions and Social Action's February meeting had so much energy and excitement! We have some wonderful things coming up in the next few months.



On Sunday, March 18th, we will be taking the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. This offering helps support our neighbors around the world by providing relief to those affected by natural disasters, provide food for the hungry, and and help empower the poor and oppressed. The One Great Hour of Sharing website (<u>http://specialofferings.pcusa.org/oghs</u>) has a wonderful world map that shows the locations of recipients of this

offering. For example, in Holyoke, Massachusetts, they received \$15,000 for their Neighbor to Neighbor campaign, which was led by community members to advocate for investment in jobs, education, and mental health reform instead of development of more prisons.



On **April 5th at 6 p.m.**, the BMSA will be sponsoring the viewing of It's Criminal at the Bradford Academy. It's Criminal is a documentary that highlights the economic and social inequities that divide the U.S. and offers a vision of how separated communities can learn to speak to each other. This documentary follows the life-changing journeys of incarcerated women and Dartmouth College students working together to write and perform an original play about the troubled and painful paths that landed the women behind bars.

for whom the plant is in memory, from whom it is being given, and to whom it is to be delivered after the service.


Bradford Congregational Church has been so blessed with the generosity and hard work of the Welch family. We may never be able to thank them enough, but we sure can try!

Back Story

Several times a month I write a "back story" for the weekly email and the website. These back stories expand on an element of the upcoming worship service. Sometimes the back stories are on the history behind a tradition, sometimes they go into the history of a hymn, and sometimes they are a biography of a composer or Saint or preacher.

Just What Are Hymns, Anyway?

Our hymnals contain three basic categories of congregational songs to be sung:

HYMNS: speaks to and of God, is one of praise and adoration. It is celebration of God, song directed to God ("Our God, Our Help In Ages Past").

PSALMS: scripture set to music ("The Lord's My Shepherd, I'll Not Want")

SPIRITUAL SONGS: testimony of a spiritual theme ("Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling").

A hymn is a <u>congregational</u> song of praise directed to God. A hymn has stanzas, and its lyrics are a "metered" poem meant to be sung. The traditional "common meter" for English hymns is 8.6.8.6 (syllables per line). "O Little Town of Bethlehem" and "Amazing Grace" are just two examples of hymns whose lyrics could be interchanged because the share the same meter.

In scripture we read that people have sung hymns since the time of Moses. David sang hymns of praise and is credited with writing many. Jesus and His disciples sang a hymn together at the Last Supper. The early church sang hymns as part of their regular meetings. Paul and Silas, with their feet in stocks in a Philippian jail, were reported to be praying and singing hymns. It's been said a Spirit-filled Christian is a singing Christian." In Ephesians 5 we read this advice, "...be filled with the Spirit, as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." Just as whistling is a natural reaction to a stroll on a fine summer's day, so too is bursting out in exuberant congregational singing a natural reaction to being filled with the Spirit!

I'm thinking about Easter music also (1 April). I plan to work an organ fanfare at the beginning of the service entitled "Napolitana" by Marco Facoli (1540--1585). The rest of the service is yet to be settled.
