First, the great and unexpected news. Our church has ben the beneficiary of a generous gift. It comes to us by way of

a trust established by Marcia Pierce who died on March 3, 2020. Many in our church remember her and speak of her fondly citing her deep devotion to our church and its ministry. I encourage you to read in full the letter written by the Trustees outlining the nature and conditions established by the trust.

Our Church has been blessed with the extraordinary generosity of one of our life-long members, Marcia M Pierce. The Bradford Congregational Church is designated to receive, as one of the beneficiaries of the Marcia M Pierce Revocable Trust, the remainder of her trust estate. The Church is required by the rules and restrictions of the Trust to use only the income generated by this bequest. Furthermore, this income can only be used to maintain our Church building and no more than ten percent of current expenses in a given year. No money from the actual bequest can ever be spent. At this time, we do not know the exact amount of this bequest.



There is no easy fix to this problem, but we do ask you to keep this need in your prayers as we strive to be of service to all our members.
