### **Say It, then DO It!**

At the 2002 Vermont Conference Annual Meeting, we voted to become an "Open and Affirming" (ONA) Conference of the United Church of Christ. The first "Be it Resolved" stated:

That we, the members of the Vermont Conference of the United Church of Christ, declare that the Conference setting is open, welcoming and affirming of all persons in all aspects of its administrative, program and worship life. We covenant with God and one another to extend welcome and Christian fellowship to all followers and seekers of Christ without fear, prejudice or discrimination due to race, gender, age, ethnicity, sexual orientation, nationality, physical, mental or emotional condition, educational, financial situation, biblical or theological interpretation, or any other circumstance that has historically been a barrier to full life, participation, membership, mission, work and ministry in the Vermont Conference setting of the United Church of Christ. We embrace them as sisters and brothers and equal partners in the Body of Christ with unlimited access to every opportunity of service to God...

Next year's Annual Meeting will be the 15th anniversary of this declaration. Today 44 [ONA churches of the Vermont Conference](#) have completed a process resulting in [ONA status](#), and more are in process. I was thinking how awesome it would be to celebrate many more churches reaching this status at Annual Meeting next year. If you'd like to get started, or have questions about process or even what it all means and why you should consider doing it, please be in touch with our ONA Consultant, [Rev. But declaring your congregation to be ONA is a beginning, not an ending. To paraphrase Lillian Daniel, it's not enough to be a church of "resolutionaries", we must be a church of revolutionaries. Many ONA churches display rainbow banners as the Conference office does.



The rainbow is now a visual symbol of welcome in a way "ONA" *church-speak*

may not achieve for those left out of churches for decades. Some churches now have gender neutral bathrooms. Other congregations use intentionality to make sure that LGBTQ folks have opportunities to be included in church leadership. Others still serve as advocates for bullied LGBTQ youth, participate in Pride events and parades, or are a place where

marriage equality is not just legal but welcomed with joy. These actions are also symbols that can proclaim with greater clarity than any ONA Statement can.

Your Vermont Conference tries to live into our ONA declaration as well.



This year we are once again a proud sponsor of Vermont Pride Theater's sixth annual Summer Pride Festival held at [Chandler Center for the Arts](#) here in Randolph. Performances run through this weekend - follow this [Chandler link](#) to find out more. And we will keep trying.

As James tells us in his excellent Epistle, it's not enough to simply state you have faith. What you do with your faith matters, because faith without action is a dead faith. Grace is a great gift, but if we don't do anything with it, what's the point? How does it change anything?


We are called to be an inclusive church, surely. So I invite you to consider how you might live into your faith statements: to act and express your faith beyond internal documents. How are you moving beyond the front door of your church to promote the change you proclaim? People outside have heard that they are not welcome, not valued, need to be "fixed" to be made right, and only matter if they are a part of someone's 'all'. People do not believe you if you simply say, you welcome everyone. If you're willing to be an ally, consider being an advocate. Let your actions (or lack thereof) speak in a way your words never will.

Someone once said that if you don't stand for something, you'll fall for anything. Full inclusion of LGBTQ people in to the life of our church is something I will stand for. Will you join me?

**Sunday in mid-October TBA** – 11:45 am – Orientation/Identity Panel discussion and information session with a light lunch served.


**Saturday, October 29<sup>th</sup>** – 8:45 am to 1:30 pm – Healthy Communication workshops and Nancy Brown return!



### Ideas and Insights for Active Congregations

#### When Charity Brings Anything But Relief

Is it possible that our best intentions can do more harm than good? Sadly, relief organizations tell us that well-meaning people don't think before they give. Some involved in humanitarian work after a natural disaster call the deluge of unwanted donations "the second disaster."

Juanita Rillig, director of the Center for International Disaster Information, described what happened after the Indian Ocean tsunami in 2004: So many donated clothes were piled on an Indonesia beach that workers had no time to sort and distribute them. The clothing pile became toxic and local officials had to destroy it all. They poured gasoline on it and sent it out to sea.<sup>1</sup> She related another example of unfortunate waste when contributors sent 100,000 liters of water to West Africa at a cost of \$300,000. Relief organizations with portable water purification units could have provided that same amount of water for \$300.

Following the December 2012 shooting tragedy in Newtown, Connecticut, more than 60,000 teddy bears arrived from around the country, along with toys, bicycles, and clothes. Already overwhelmed, residents had to get a warehouse to hold it all.

#### Crisis Relief or Chronic Needs?

Because Americans are compassionate, they tend to respond initially with their hearts rather than their minds. Even Warren Buffett admitted that it is much easier to make money than it is to give it away wisely. The first step is assessing whether an event is a crisis or a reflection of ongoing chronic needs.

*Crisis relief.* Churches and people of faith offer the best immediate crisis relief when they make smart cash donations to trusted organizations. In most cases, sending supplies is simply not practical. Responding to a crisis with immediate relief is likely a month-long effort.

*Chronic needs* call for complex solutions, hard work, and long-term commitments. The commitment required when tackling these situations is likely an effort of years or decades. When well-meaning people behave as if they are addressing a crisis rather than a chronic need, the longterm results are dependency, deception, and disempowerment.<sup>2</sup> Churches need to engage strategically in both types

of charity efforts.

### **Making Meaningful Change through Mercy and Justice**

Many congregations involve members in mission trips and volunteer opportunities in local service projects. Unfortunately, too many mission trips or local service projects are not a wise investment, do not significantly improve quality of life, and do not relieve poverty for the intended community. For example, the funds spent for one Central American ministry mission trip to repaint an orphanage would be enough money to hire two local painters, pay the salaries of two full-time teachers, and purchase new uniforms for every school student.<sup>3</sup>
