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## **Word from the Pastor**

The Church, of all the institutions in the world, is the only one that sees beyond the celebration of Christ's birth to a larger and fuller vision. For the Church, this season of advent is not a commemoration of what happened long ago in some obscure Judean town, but the affirmation that it will happen yet again. The words we proclaim in the Lord's Prayer, "Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven" are awaiting their final fulfillment and the Church lives in expectancy. We profess that Christ will come again and perfect justice and perfect love will govern the world. We have the audacity to proclaim that God is not done yet.

The secular observance of Christmas has removed this futuristic gaze. It is a celebration of what happened long ago. It does not look ahead. It turns and looks to the past. I suppose this is comforting. We can wrap the season in a cozy reminiscence of a past that commemorates what has happened but places little demand on the present. We are called by the secular world to remember rather than reform.

God's expectation of us is far more demanding than a reenactment of Jesus' birth. It calls us to look again for the inbreaking of God, to see in the ordinary, the veiling of God's mysterious presence. We do not know where Christ will come again, where the incarnate presence of God will make itself known. But we are called to expect it, to hone our senses, that our hearts and minds be quickened for the One who comes again. Advent is a time of introspection when we are called to ask ourselves if our lives are

attuned to God's coming. Because the fact of the matter is that most folks slept undisturbed when the first Christmas came long ago. Our task is to awaken to a presence that is about to come. Let us then live lives of expectant hope. Rather than celebrating what has been, may we live into the future of what will be.

Now out of print, these wonderful guides to keeping our focus during ther Advent season are hard to find online, but our intrepid Bridget Peters kept up the search and found these few. We are hopeful that every family in our congregation now has a copy!

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**ADVENT DEVOTIONALS**, sponsored by your Board of Deacons, will be offered following our service of worship on **December 1<sup>st</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>** in the vestry and will feature a potluck meal and a program for children. During Advent, Pastor Jeff will develop a sermon series with the overall theme of "Living In The Midst Of The Wait." Our sessions will build on this theme. Please plan on joining us as we seek to bring a spiritual understanding to the four Sundays in Advent; activities for the children will be provided. Pastor Jeff's outline of the discussions are below.

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## **Living in the Midst of the Wait**

### **Introduction to Session One, Dec 1 .,, Pastor Jeff**

I would like to explore what it means for us to wait for the Kingdom of God. If we bring to Advent an awareness of what it means to wait in everyday life, then there are certain conditions which must be assumed:

- First, when we have to wait for an event, a physical object, or a person, we wait knowing what it is we are expecting. You cannot wait for what you do not know. Suppose you are waiting for guests to arrive. You have to know they are coming before you can say you are waiting for them.
- Second, you have some idea of what your guests' arrival will look like. There will be an unfamiliar car in your driveway or other telltale signs that people are on the premises.
- Third, you know where to expect your guests — they will, in all probability, come to the front door so you know when the doorbell rings that it is, most likely, your guests. But we are waiting for Christ to come again, for His Kingdom to be established.

So for our session today, let these be our guiding questions: 1. What is it that you are waiting for? Can you give any background? What drove you to wait for this particular thing? 2. When will you know that your wait is over?

# Living in the Midst of the Wait

## Introduction to Session Two, Dec 15 ... Pastor Jeff

In our last meeting, we discussed the nature of waiting. In this session I would like us to explore how we are to fashion our lives as Christians when what we longed for does not come into being. A gardener plants a seed and must wait for a plant to appear. Indeed, the gardener may not be privy to the moment the seed sends forth roots. The gardener must live trusting in what cannot be seen.

- How does this apply to your waiting for Christ and His Kingdom? Jesus states in Mark 1:15 "The kingdom of God is at hand."
- If this is true, when in your life have you experienced God's kingdom.
- A gardener cares for the seed by ensuring it is watered and not choked by weeds. If the kingdom of God is at hand, what must you do to care for God's kingdom?

The holiday season is now upon us to help dispel the gloom brought on by foul weather and short days! Specifically the Christmas Season begins officially with Advent on 1 December.

The music will become ever more "Christmasy" as the season progresses. We will introduce Advent (Hope) on the newly restored Steinway piano with a piece by Edvard Grieg entitled "Bell Ringing" which will morph into a version of "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." The choir anthems sung during 1, 8, and 22 December will be new arrangements of familiar Christmas tunes. She will join Bridget Peters in singing "The Virgin at the Cribb" by Cesar Franck. Finally, on the last Sunday of December the congregation will be invited to a hymn sing. We at the Bradford United Church of Christ are blessed to have a faithful choir of five talented members: Janice Blake, Joan Osgood, Bridget Peters, Martina Stever, and Marcia Tomlinson. The speed with which the choir learns music continues to amaze me, and with just five members!



Our church is a big fan of the Creche (preschool) in India supported by Help Kids India. Here is their update after the fire that destroyed their kitchen. We were only too happy to donate to its restoration.

A new kitchen for Little Lilies Preschool. Hilda Isaac, Managing Director writes: The little lilies kitchen was destroyed in the last year November 16th Gaja cyclone. So as a daily remembrance we set the opening date to 16th of November.

Without the help of HKI, it may not be possible. The new Kitchen's roof was decorated with balloons, the door frame with floral garlands and the floor with traditional Kolam. All the parents were invited to the opening function. The kitchen was opened by me followed by a prayer. As per Tamil tradition milk is boiled and let to flow. This indicates the place will be blessed with abundance. Salt and turmeric are the first things to bring inside the Kitchen as a custom.

After the customs, the construction workers were honored by small gift of dress materials. Then all the children, parents and teachers were given a feast of Chicken curry, Rice and a sweet porridge made of vermicelli. The parents gifted the school with small Kitchen utensils. Some of the parents join together to buy some large vessels too.

The whole community feels very proud of the new kitchen. Thank you so much to everyone who made this possible.
